The Italian Connection



Over the last year, we have been part of some connections to the town of Castel di Sangro in Italy. Castel di Sangro is an Italian town that was liberated from the Germans by the West Nova Scotia Regiment in November 1943.

It was 22 November and it had been raining for about two weeks. It was miserable and cold living in the outdoors. The recce had been done by the 3 Bde Comd, Brigadier Gibson and the WNSR CO, Lt.Col Pat Bogert. The monastery on top of Point 1009 (the high feature in the photo) had become a German strongpoint, and they could see up and down the Sangro River. We had to get them out of there and capture Point 1009 as anyone could see that it was the Vital Ground in that area.

The whole of 1st Division was on the South side of

the Sangro because it had swollen because of the incessant rain. It wasn't terribly deep, but it posed a significant obstacle for a Divisional level crossing in full view of the enemy in the monastery, especially since the entire south bank of the Sangro had been sown with anti-tank and anti-pers mines. Many of them were the wooden shoe mines,

quite a few of them booby-trapped as the Germans needed to slow down the advancing Allied Army in any way possible; that's why all the bridges had been blown by the retreating Germans.

Yes, the West Novas would take Point 1009. They would attack under cover of darkness in the pouring rain. H-hour was 0100 on 23 Nov, and that's when they would "set off in the pouring rain and the utter darkness for the hill". B Coy would do the job, led by Capt Hugh Burns of Kentville; he had worked with his father on the Kentville Advertiser before joining up to do his part in the War.

The lead PI was commanded by Lieut JA Blackie Blanchard (below right) of Charlottetown, PEI. At 22 years of age, he hadn't lived much, but he knew his craft, and he was well-respected


That's Point 1009 in the photo (sometimes referred to as The Castle), and the monastery is at the very top. It would be a difficult climb even in the daytime without the rain, but the noise of the rain would, to some degree, cover the sound of their approach. There was only one clear path, but even on the path there was a lot of loose rock which was made even more dangerous

by the water running down the slopes.

As one might expect, the communications between the attacking company and the Bn HQ failed shortly after the company left unit lines, so they were on their own for the whole of the operation, and the HQ was in the dark in more ways than one.

It was so dark and the weather was so miserable that Lieut Blanchard's men passed through the German lines unnoticed, and, before they knew it, they were making a rush on the monastery to do house-clearing with grenades, rifles, and Bren Guns. However, the Germans caught them in their withering machinegun fire from both sides of the plateau. Several West Novas were killed or wounded and the lieutenant was mortally wounded and shouting for his men to go back before they were all killed. He died on that hill on that night, and some of his men were able to escape because of his courage and leadership.

The remaining platoons tried the impossible task of reaching the top, but they were often turned back with showers of grenades as they attempted the ascent. The defender unquestionably had the advantage.



There's much more to the story but no room to tell it here. On 24 Nov, several regiments of field and medium artillery began a heavy concentration of fire on Point 1009. Five thousand rounds from eight of the artillery regiments fell on the position within half an hour. This time, using the thundering artillery barrage to cover their approach, A Cov of the West Novas conducted a flanking assault while C Coy provided covering fire support from the front. By late afternoon, Point 1009 was ours, and A Coy didn't have to fire a shot to get it. When they arrived on the objective, the enemy was nowhere to be seen, having withdrawn the night before.

At our 67th Reunion, the Guest Speaker was Mike Conway, nephew of Lieut JA Blanchard, and the Guest of Honour was Signore Alessandro Teti, an engineer and author from Castel di Sangro who came to meet and speak with Mike and with Victor Dukeshire who was in Lieut Blanchard's platoon on that night. Victor was with his brother that night on Point 1009 when his brother, Garth, was wounded in that battle in the dark and the rain. Talk about a reunion; it was fabulous. Signore Teti was hosted at a reception by Kentville Town Council on the Monday after the reunion, and a process was set in place to establish a twinning between the Town of Kentville and Castel di Sangro.


A ceremony will be held in Castel di Sangro this summer to honour the West Novas who fought to save their town. It will be attended by the Her Worship, Mayor Sandra Snow of Kentville.. Also attending will be a delegation of West Novas from the RA, including Garry Randall, former CO George McGrath, and RA President Ron Stonier, all paying their own way. As well, LCol Harris, currently serving in an American HQ in Irag, hopes to be able to attend if duty permits.

WNSR 80th Anniversary Magazine

The 80th Anniversary of the formation of the WNSR from the Annapolis Regiment and the Luneburg Regiment occurred on 15 December 2016. The Regiment celebrated with cake and a get together at Camp Aldershot, but 80 is a special milestone. In the past, we have marked the occasion of reaching a new decade by the publication of an anniversary magazine. We began the tradition in 1986 on the 50th Anniversary and followed suit on the 60th and 70th Anniversaries. Our publication date wasn't until February of 2017, but that's because we wanted to get all the news of

the previous ten years in. We've included stories on the serving members, the Regimental Association, and the WNSR affiliated Army Cadet Corps.



Through the combined efforts of the Unit and the RA, we were able to produce a commemorative publication of which we can be proud, and I think we've done that, but you'll have to be the judge. Some of the Regular force units produce such a magazine on a more frequent basis, but they have several full strength battalions to support them as well as many more resources. I think the West Novas can stand tall and know that they lead the way in this regard.

We printed 500 copies and have distributed a number to organizations and people who have supported our project through advertizing. We have distributed copies to the unit so that every soldier will have one. The five cadet corps have received a number of copies, and copies were passed to the Valley and South Shore Memory Clubs. We've mailed copies to members who have paid postage, and we'll do the same for you if you want. We plan to have enough copies on hand for the reunion in Sept so that members can have their own copy.

Canada 150: West Novas in Peace and War

Last year, the Regimental Association, with the help of the Regiment, was able to mount an exhibit of WNSR weapons, uniforms, and artifacts to showcase our history, specifically the Scout-Sniper Platoon of the Second World War. By all reports, people liked what they saw, and so the WNSR History Committee accepted the challenge of mounting a significantly expanded exhibit at the Annapolis Valley Macdonald Museum in Middleton, another Valley town where the West Novas have had a presence for a long time.



This year's exhibit is called <u>Canada 150: West Novas in Peace and War</u> and it will have its official opening at 1400 hours on 07 May 2017, and all West Novas are more than welcome to attend. Please join us for the official opening. If you can't make it then, the exhibit is on during regular hours until 30 September. The team planning, organizing, and executing this exhibit is led by former CO, Col (Ret'd) Tom Stinson and includes members; Garry Randall, Duke Davidson, Jo Bishop, and Ron Stonier. Many others have contributed to make this the best exhibit we've put on so far.

Included in the exhibit will be the Scout-Sniper display from last year, a display on 18 West Novas from WWII who were also members of the 1st Special Service Force (the Devil's Brigade), a display about the West Novas contribution to the War in Afghanistan that earned us a new battle honour, and a display about six West Novas who started off in our Regiment and went on to achieve very successful careers in the military or RCMP.

Regimental Memorial Coin Project Completion



At the recent Executive Committee Meeting at Aldershot, it was agreed that we will order the remaining 108 Memorial Coins for West Novas killed in WWII alphabetically from Pte DJ McLean to Pte WB Zwicker. Some are already spoken for, and we will publish a list of available coins in the next newsletter. This completes the project which began in 2014 to strike a Memorial Coin for every West Nova killed overseas in WWII.

Every member of the Regimental Association receives a Regimental Memorial Coin as part of his or her membership. However, you can also purchase additional coins for yourself or for friends and family for \$25 each without joining the RA.

There are three variants of the coin: Memorial, Blank, and Cadet. Memorial coins will each be one of a kind; that is, a soldier's name will not be used a second time.

At the last Regimental Association AGM in September 2016, Honorary Colonel John Leefe moved to establish an "Operational Deployment Certificate" to be issued to qualified West Novas. It was decided that either international or domestic operations would be included as well as service in The Second World War and the Korean War. The motion as amended passed unanimously.

Qualifying service may be completed prior to, during, or after service in the West Nova Scotia Regiment. Personnel attached to the WNSR would also qualify for the certificate.

Consideration for award of the certificate starts when the soldier completes the application form.

- Application form provides us with your contact information and information on operations served
- Only one certificate will be issued per soldier
- Certificate will show all qualifying operations
- Certificates will be personally presented to qualified soldiers at Regimental or Association functions at the earliest opportunity
- If presentation is not possible, certificates may be mailed to the recipient
- Certificate is $8\frac{1}{2}$ X 11" in colour and will be similar in appearance to the sample
- The Operational Deployment Certificate is a small gesture made within the Regimental Family to show that we recognize the service provided to the Nation by the veterans of our Regiment.
- The statement on the certificate reads: "The Regimental Association is grateful for the selfless service rendered in the best tradition of the West Nova Scotia Regiment. The veterans of today are the true torch bearers of those who have gone before."
